**EFO Allison Eckel** **ALLISON ECKEL, cont'd:** Our administrator, solicitor, CFO, prosecutor, first assistant prosecutor, clerk, superintendent of elections, head of social services and head of resource conservation and parks are all women, along with two of the five commissioners – and so many more women are part of this team. I am on the ballot in November to keep my seat. I have many areas of interest, but among my highest priorities as a commissioner are environmental sustainability and healthy communities, workforce development, and equitable access to county programs.

**Evans & Harris for Hainsport Twp. Comm.** **ANNA EVANS, cont'd:** representing all township residents, regardless of district, party affiliation, gender identity, race, or social status. I believe in open and honest communication maximizing the use of new technologies. This is my fourth time running for this office and I have been fortunate to receive the support of ALICE's List each of the past three times. New challenges to my core beliefs continue, such as the recent Supreme Court decision to overturn Roe v. Wade. I immediately wrote a letter to local papers protesting this decision, which will be a setback to women, especially those of color, and has the potential to adversely affect future LGBTQ+ rights.
